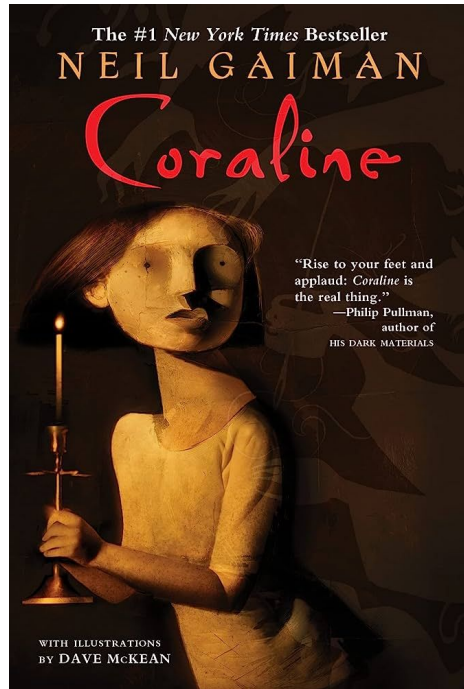


Coraline

Neil Gaiman (b 1960)







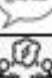

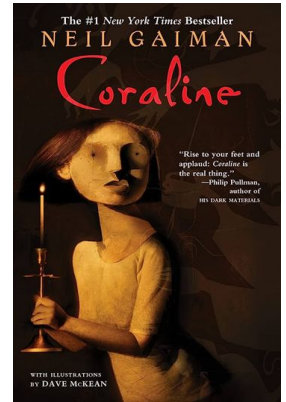
Neil Gaiman (b 1960)

- He said... *"Things need not have happened to be true. Tales and dreams are the shadow-truths that will endure when mere facts are dust and ashes, and forgot."*
- Did you know? In Neil Gaiman's book "Coraline," the character Coraline's name was actually a result of a typo. Gaiman intended to name her "Caroline," but he mistyped it as "Coraline." He liked the accidental name so much that he decided to keep it for the character.
